Built with Purpose

Hero Father

- Lead with love and humility

Villain Father

Building a Legacy

- **Create family rhythm:** Build simple, consistent habits like bedtime prayers, Saturday breakfasts, or short daily check-ins.
- **Keep a hero journal:** Write down where you led well and where you want to grow. Watch how God shapes you over time.
- **Ask for feedback:** Listen with humility. Ask your children or or close friend what makes them feel loved.
- **Stay connected:** Don't father alone. "Iron sharpens iron." Surround yourself with other dads who will encourage and challenge you.

A Legacy That Lasts

You were called to be a father. You were not chosen by accident. God placed you in this role to show His love to your children. Every moment you forgive, listen, or lead with patience, you show them a glimpse of Him.

There will be hard days—and days you hit it out of the park. There will be moments you fall short, but through it all, your Heavenly Father is with you. When things get rough, you can always point your children to Him.

Be the dad you've been called to be. Show up. Stand strong. Man up.
